Lloyd George "Whistler" Nelson, II, of Carbondale, passed away on Saturday, August 10, 2019.

He was born on January 9, 1953 in Tower City, PA to Lloyd George and Bessie (Thurston) Nelson.

Lloyd married Cindy Gerrish at Devil's Kitchen on October 18, 1980.

He attended Bucknell University in Lewisburg, PA for his undergraduate studies, then to SIUC for his masters in Zoology. While at SIUC he was PA teaching in waterfowl.

He was employed for a short time in North Dakota with the Department of Natural Resources before returning to Southern Illinois. He was employed with the Jackson County Sheriff's Office as the animal control officer for over 38 years.

Lloyd played, coached and umpired softball, was the organizer for the Murphysboro District Park numerous softball leagues for over 30 years. He coached women's co-ed, Miss-n-Hitters and women's Hit-n-Misses for over 40 years. He was the founder of Southern Illinois Select Allstar High School Girls Fast Pitch Softball game. He was vice president of USA/ASA, Director of Men's D and E State Tournament, and in 2019 was inducted into the USA/ASA State Hall of Fame.

He was an IHSA Football Referee for over 30 years. A strong supporter of Southern Illinois Special Olympics for 35 plus years.

He was also an avid hunter and fisherman, but his passion was rabbit hunting with his special friend, Scott Hale and their beagles.

Lloyd is survived by his wife, Cindy and his dog, Lucy. He is also survived by his USA/ASA Family and a host of friends.

He was preceded in death by his parents, special companions, Barney, Coli, Foxy, Mollie, Rufus and his special Rosie.

A Celebration of Life will be at a later date, hosted by the family.

“ I first got to know Lloyd when we were members of SIUC's Animal Care Committee in the 1990s. I quickly learned how intelligent, knowledgeable, compassionate, and practical he was — and how he could diffuse a tense situation with a funny remark or an observation of the world beyond the sterile research labs. My husband and I knew him, too, as Jackson County's animal control officer. Lloyd responded patiently and immediately to our requests to check on a dog running loose or living on a chain or without shelter, water, and fresh food. He saved many domestic and wild animals in pain or great distress and he taught pet owners how to be responsible and loving. He was constrained by the county laws he had to work under, but he knew how to stretch them a bit depending on the situation. He told me once that a dog, even on a chain, was the only love — to receive and to give — that some children had in their lives. The Friends of Giant City Park gave Lloyd life membership for his work at the park to rescue hurt and abandoned animals. I am so very sorry to learn that Lloyd is no longer in our community. My sincere condolences to Cindy, his family, his many friends, and his animal buddies.
