Keith M. McQuarrie, 77 of Carbondale, passed away on Monday, January 8, 2024 at his home.

Keith was born on May 12, 1946 in Peoria IL to Harold and Betty (Hoffman) McQuarrie. He was a graduate of Woodruff High School and earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. During his academic years, Keith was a member of the SIU Skydiving team with 100's of jumps to his credit.

Keith was drafted during the Vietnam war and served his country for 2 years in the Army. He was a member of the Murphysboro Legion and Honor Guard for the last 14 years. He also directed the Veterans Golf scramble which raised money for local veterans in need.

Keith retired from SIU as Chief Academic Advisor for the college of Applied

Sciences and Arts. During his tenure, he received the distinguished award of Administrative Professional Employee of the year.

Keith was a lifetime member of the River to River Running club and served as race director for the River to River Relay for 10 years. He was an accomplished athlete completing many marathons and triathlons. His proudest accomplishment was qualifying for and competing in the Ironman World Championships in Kona Hawaii. He was active in Senior Golf League at Hickory Ridge golf course. Keith made an annual trip to the Boundary Waters of Minnesota and Canada where he fished for the last 73 years. He also gave back to his community by volunteering for many years at the Newman Center Thanksgiving dinner, St. Francis Christmas dinner and Victory Dream Center food pantry.

Keith was a loving, gentle person who touched many lives and always had a smile, strong handshake and positive outlook.

Survivors include his wife Sandra Semrow of Carbondale and his brother Neil McQuarrie of Ann Arbor Michigan.

Cremation rites will be accorded. A service is being planned for a later date.

*I am sorry I am late to this posting; I only just learned of Keith's passing.*

*Keith and I served together at the American Embassy in Bonn, Germany in 1970 and, though we lost touch after the war for nearly 50 years, he was a steadfast and wonderful friend all that time. When I located him again a few years ago, it was as if we'd never been apart.*

*When I was reassigned in 1970, Keith volunteered to drive my second car up to Bremerhaven for shipment to the USA. Despite snowy weather he braved the roads, and when the wipers gave out, finished the delivery by hanging out the window with a snow scraper so he could see to drive! Ever a friend in need - and ever stalwart! In the June of the last year, he told me, "I feel so good, that it is hard to imagine that I am sick. So, the daily activities have not changed. Still walking, swimming, weight training and cycling (and on Saturdays we go to yard sales)!" He told me his Mom figured she would never die with work unfinished, and added, "I am that way with books. I always have 3 - 4 waiting to be started." We shared that love of reading, and he encouraged me in my own fledgling writing efforts.*

*When I wrote to him about my own misgivings about a surprise cancer diagnosis of my own, his response was, "As with most things in life, your attitude and outlook will play a large role in your outcome. I have always said that I see no value in anything other than a positive view of things. So, move forward with that in mind and keep your spirits high and your feet moving forward." He made a point of inviting updates from me and said, "I am honored to call you friend and to walk beside you and Betty Jo in this. My prayers will definitely include you. Always a blessing, and never a burden to hear from you."*

*When my own surgery was so successful, he was effusive in his gratitude for my outcome. And he said, as he was going in for port installation, "Well, I hope to use you as a role model in all of this." and "Glad that you and Betty Jo are walking beside us - thanks for being in my corner."*
